
THE Core

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I am happy to report the GM search is continuing to move forward in a positive direction. The GM Search Commission has narrowed the field of candidates down to the finalists. The Board has started bringing those finalists on site for tours and interviews.

The Board approved moving forward with listing the ACL dredge for sale with a broker. If you are wondering why, I will try to explain. The dredge has been underutilized for various reasons,

like being short-staffed or not having a qualified staff member to run it. In previous years, the Association has been spending \$10,000 to have the dredge put in and taken out of the lake, \$8,000 in insurance, and \$4,500 per year in maintenance & repairs. That is \$22,500 per year before labor. Since we own the dredge, it is also on the reserve study to be replaced when its useful life comes to an end. The dredge has an estimated cost of \$600,000 and a lifespan of 40 years in the reserve study. Using those estimates, a minimum of \$15,000 would have to be saved annually to prepare for the replacement. Using those estimates, keeping the dredge costs \$37,500 per year without labor. Based on our experience this year with contract dredging, if we contract dredge every ten years it costs \$72,000 annually for both the equipment and labor.

The Board also approved to move forward with the owners of The Pit Stop restaurant in Stockton to operate The Cove. The lease will be for 2 years.

The 2024 Board of Directors election should be a good one. Now that the deadline for candidate applications has passed, there are 7 property owners that applied to run for the 3 open seats. I encourage everyone to do their homework on the candidates and vote. Please make sure to get your ballots turned in on time.

THE GENERAL MANAGER UPDATE



A Review of the Past 6 Months

The Pro Shop had a great turn out for their New Year's Eve Party on December 31st. Members enjoyed drinks and an appetizer buffet as they partied and rang in the New Year.

In January, all 2024 statements and dues were sent out to property owners. Throughout the month the maintenance team

set up and filled the NiceRink ice rink at the end of the Pro Shop parking lot. Due to all the snow, we have received, the ice rink has taken longer to fill and freeze than expected. Members should be able to enjoy it in February.

With all the changes in staff this past year we will be having North Star training for all staff in the Association. We have many new staff that have never received proper training, as well as staff whose roles have changed that can benefit from additional training.

We have begun taking bids for the old firehouse roof. We have received bids from The Thistle Group and are working with them to get the project started. At the beginning of the year, ACL received a \$9,000 grant towards the removal of invasive species in the Winchester and Independence subdivisions.

Lastly, we have received our permit from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources for the work to be done on the dam and spillway. It was exciting to see water coming over the waterfall again. As of Wednesday, January 17th at 7:30 AM, 2 months and 4 days after the drawdown, water has begun flowing over the spillway and waterfall again.

ACLPOA Board Approved Policy THE APPLE CORE: ACCEPTANCE OF MATERIAL

The Apple Core is published by the ACLPOA for the benefit of its Members - to keep them informed about developments with respect to the lake, facilities, activities and finances; to report Board decisions; to provide a handy reference about rules, fees and coming events; and to afford a means of communication on questions and issues of importance to property owners.

The Editorial Review Committee shall consist of a member of the Board, who shall be the Chair; the General Manager, who shall be Vice-Chair; the Editor of The Apple Core, who shall be the Secretary; and such other members as the Board may appoint from time to time. This Committee shall prepare policies for the acceptance of material to be printed in The Apple Core, including, but not limited to, letters to the editor and policies for advertising material printed, which policies shall be submitted to the Board for approval annually.

The General Manager is responsible for having the paper produced. The Communications Director is the Editor. Any and all editorial material (copy other than paid advertising) must be submitted to the Editor's office.

The Editorial Review Committee will determine whether or not letters, advertising material or any other material submitted for publication should be rejected. If material is rejected, property owners will be notified and told cause of rejection.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:

Letters from Property Owners are welcome.

Letters to the Editor must be:

- a) Submitted and signed by a Property Owner.
- b) Received by the 15th of the month previous to publication.
- c) Confined to 250 words or less.

The following guidelines for treatment of letters have been adopted for the purpose of encouraging expression of views with the focus on discussion of issues not people. Publication of letters does not necessarily imply agreement or endorsement by the Association or the Board of Directors.

- Whenever possible, letters expressing views on both sides of an issue will be published at the same time.
- Constructive criticism will be accepted. Positive suggestions for improvement are encouraged.
- Letters must be in good taste. Those containing offensive or derogatory language, libelous statements or expressing personal grievances or conflicts will not be published
- Nothing in these guidelines should be construed to prohibit references to people so long as an issue of importance is the focus of the letter.
- Editorial comments will be limited to factual clarification or update on the matter at issue. No point of view will be expressed.

WITH RESPECT TO BOARD ELECTIONS:

- 1) Candidates will be presented in the March and April issues.
- 2) A special section for questions regarding candidates will be included in the March and April issues of The Apple Core. Questions regarding candidates must be received thirteen (13) days prior to copy deadline in order to provide the candidates with the opportunity to respond in the same edition. Candidate responses must be received two (2) days prior to copy deadlines.

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ACL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES

DECEMBER 16, 2023

Call to Order: 8:00 AM

Executive Session - 8:00 AM.

Return to Open Session – motion to return to open session made by Carmel Cottrell at 9:24 am. Second by Brian Holt, motion carried unanimously.

- 4.0 Pledge of Allegiance after the Pledge of Allegiance, a quorum was present with the following Directors in attendance: Nolan Mullen, John Anderson, Bob Ballenger, Bill Becker, Carmel Cottrell, Brian Holt, Mark Kosco (via Zoom), Debra McNamee, and Laura Pratt. Interim General Manager Mike Harris was also present.
- 5.0 Approve/Adopt Minutes from the November 18, 2023, Board Meeting – Laura Pratt motioned "to approve/ adopt the minutes from the November 18, 2023, Board Meeting." Seconded by John Anderson. Correction -6.0 on Treasurers report – Mark Kosco noted that he reported the report would not be in The Apple Core due to not having updated numbers. Minutes, with correction, approved unanimously.
- 6.0 Treasurer's Report Steve Borst reported on the Treasurer's Report, filling in for Mark Kosco. Projecting a \$388,000 deficit. Every department balances out and is breaking even except The Cove \$411,000 loss projection for The Cove. This is not year-to-date; this is a projection. Steve was very impressed with the staff that he worked with on this project. Will work with them to get a year end and have numbers to the Board on a monthly basis.
- 7.0 Committee/Commission Reports

R&R – Brian Holt reported.

Maintenance - Carmel Cottrell reported they are looking at more information on selling the dredge and looking at a second compactor or bailer for cardboard. Memorial Pavilion - Carmel Cottrell reported the pavilion is going very well - hoping to be completely done by spring.

- 8.0 General Manager's Report Mike Harris gave an overview of what has been going on over the last 5.5 months he has been there. Memorial Pavilion is finally underway. Main road into clubhouse been repaved. New surface for multipurpose complex. The Cove has been closed for the season and sanitized. New water valve for Lake managing system. Actively interviewing for new GM and making progress. Overhauled finance department. Cutting down invasives and trees around the clubhouse. \$70,000 in grant money was received in the last two weeks. Firehouse roof approved for long awaited repair. Cleaned up the mess at Nixon Beach and Quarry. Zebra mussels have been in a sharp decline. Holiday party for staff reinstated. Payroll transferred to Steve Borst with zero errors, thank you Steve. ACL employee handbook being updated. Vacation and PTO time has been corrected and reconciled. Lake Carroll stated we are far ahead of them in many ways, including financial software and internet. Our lake has been selected for IL High School Fishing Contest in 2025. Ice skating rink set up. 100% of our security cameras are working for the first time. Re-engineering staff to improve efficiency. NorthStar training will start in January. Short term rentals - if we would have done a survey – 3 questions – \$1000 fee, is that the right price to charge? Lower the price? Or drop short term rentals completely? Wonder how that survey would come out.
- 9.0 President's Report President's Report will be in The

Apple Core.

- 10.0 Any Additions to the Agenda None
- 11.0 Consent Agenda
- 11.1 Committee/Commission Changes Bill Becker motioned "to allow Lynette Swedberg, Kevin Smith, and Ken Menconi to join the Rules & Regulations Commission." Seconded by John Anderson, motion carried unanimously.
- 12.0 Unfinished Business
- 12.1 Annual Assessment Bill Becker motioned "to adopt the 2024 Annual Assessment of \$1,310." Seconded by Carmel Cottrell. Raising 5%. Budget process started in June; we did not have year to date actuals then. The actuals in September gave us a completely different picture. Marina for example, changed for the good, that helped. Pro Shop numbers were much better than projected. Motion carried unanimously.
- 12.2 R&R Budget Laura Pratt motioned "to adopt the recommended 2024 R&R Budget in the amount of \$601,500 in expenditures." Seconded by Carmel Cottrell, motion carried unanimously.
- 12.3 Operating Budget Carmel Cottrell motioned "to adopt the recommended 2024 Operating Budget with a total revenue of \$5,143,951 and total operating expenses of \$5,143,025 with a transfer to the R&R Fund of \$500,000 and a transfer to the Capital Fund of \$500,000." This budget is balanced and repays our deficit from 2023. Seconded by Deb McNamee, motion carries with Mark Kosco voting nay
- 12.4 Operating & Building Fees Deb McNamee motioned to adopt the 2024 Operating Fee Schedule and the 2024 Building Fee Schedule, seconded by Carmel Cottrell. Discussion: This is what was published in The Apple Core. Bill Becker - should table the short-term rental for this year – not enough data out there. Do we want short-term rentals, how many? Should go to the membership. John Anderson don't want to discourage this – they spend money here. Brian Holt – we don't know how many we have right now. R&R Commission heard from several neighbors of these rental properties; weekends are a nightmare for them. Security issues as well. Need more information in order to understand the problems. R&R is currently working on a registration system for short-term rentals. Mark Kosco – we do have a rule on registering your house if it is a rental property - should look at that. Deb McNamee – initially against this fee but in favor of a registration system. Carmel Cottrell called around – \$100-\$150 rental fees on average. Carmel Cottrell motioned "to amend the short-term rentals on the fee schedule to \$200 registration fee." Seconded by Bob Ballenger. Motion carried on the amendment unanimously. Amended Motion on the table is "to adopt the 2024 Fee Schedules with the amended short term rental fee of \$200.00, rest all the same." Motion carried unanimously.
- 13.0 New Business

13.1 Short-Term Rentals - Brian Holt motioned "to approve Recommendation from R&R: 1. The yearly registration fee of \$1000, paid to the Association on or before March 1st. Late fees will apply. 2. Failure to register a rental property will result in a fine of \$2000." Seconded by Bill Becker. Brian Holt amended his motion "\$200 registration fee and failure to register penalty \$400." Seconded by Bill Becker. Discussion: Appeal process—same as any other fine. This is not about raising funds, it's about the registration process.

Per occurrence? How are other fines listed-be consistent. Brian Holt further amended his motion to include the penalty of \$400.00 if failed to register, is "per occurrence." Seconded by Bob Ballenger, motion carried unanimously. Motion, twice amended, carried unanimously.

14.0 Property Owner Comments Ken Johnson 12A128 - Subleasing the same boat dock for a few years. On assignment day, a good percentage of people that come to that are turning over the same thing - sign up again for the same sublease. We could handle differently. If you don't want a new dock, should be able to get that assigned ahead of the meeting. Allow people to default to sub-leasing, pay

in advance ahead of the meeting, avoid some of the exposure and complications of running that meeting. Approximately 20-30 people just taking the same one. Nolan – was supposed to happen automatically.

Mary Hannon – Who is looking for The Cove operator? Ad Hoc committee set up? Zooming process is terrible. Use microphones always. We are interested and involved volunteers.

Ron Carpenter – 11247 – Thanks to all volunteers at this organization. How many volunteer hours are spent - would be interesting to know. Complaint today - timing of these Property Owner Comments at the end of the meeting. Items on the agenda that people would like to talk about and not given the opportunity. Diane Carr 2A29 - Agree with Deb's comments about getting facts and numbers we need about the Pro Shop. We had an opportunity to have a consultant do that for us. What we were going for.

Okerman 6A17 - Josh and I are avid travelers - our budget is revisited monthly. We wanted a space to take our kids, and build space, etc., so we checked out different lake communities. Found ACL and loved it. To make this sustainable, we wanted to rent out house out. Followed all of the processes. Concerned about the fee of \$1,000 - very grateful for the fee change. Would love to be part of a subcommittee putting together the registration processes.

LeAnne Killeen 12A62 - Would like to see a paper property directory come out, or on NorthStar. Use my old the paper directory a lot—part of Recreation Commission to find volunteers. Please consider doing another paper directory.

Henry Doden - 13A129 - On the internet, click on something and it told me there were 411 rental properties at ACL. The Board has to remember that everybody shares equally at running the place. Problem - some are worth more; the stakes are not the same. Agree with Ron - Property Owner Comments should come before the items on the agenda so they can be addressed.

At 10:42 AM, motion to adjourn by Mark Kosco, seconded by John Anderson. Motion carried.

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
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FLOOD MITIGATION

Q: I just heard that the lake will be lowered again come October 1 or shortly thereafter. This past season, it was already on the bubble of being too low to get our boat out without scraping bottom. We are concerned for this boating season if the water does not go back to at least the level it was. Our slip might not be usable. What is the plan for this coming season to make sure our boat slip is usable? What is the plan for next year's boating season?

A. While similar questions exist on the website, we will add clarification to your question. Indeed the project is scheduled to start after Labor Day in 2024 and there MAYBE a need for a lake draw down similar to what was done in November of 2023. The experiment in 2023 allowed us to see what happens to docks, boats, etc during an eighteen-inch drawdown. We recognized that more than an 18-24inch drawdown will cause additional challenges not only to the docks/boats but also on the lake refilling process, especially if we have a drought again as experienced in 2023 after the test. No need for alarm during the 2024 boating season, the lake has refilled to normal pool level as of this writing, 1/9/24. There may be some logistical challenges come late 2024 but bidding for the project is currently underway and the ways and means of constructing the spillway is yet to be seen. Our intent is to minimize the potential drawdown to less than 2 feet by building a cofferdam of some sort so construction can take place, lake would be navigable, and refilling would be finished by boating season of 2025. No guarantees but that is the desire for all of us at ACL. Stay tuned and come back to the Flood Mitigation website for further information, hopefully by April 2024 we will know more.



We happily focus our 2024 Garden Club Spring Events on Bees. The bee is often thought to symbolize community, friendship and selflessness, as well as brightness, joy, beauty, and celebration. These qualities remind us of what our Garden Club members stand for. We see all over the gift shops to bee yourself, bee happy, bee humble, and bee kind to name a few. Unfortunately, bees sometime get a bad rap for being a stinging pest. In actuality, we should be thankful that bees volunteer their time, talent, energy and life to provide so much for the world.

When I was researching information about bees, I learned something most valuable to me. You see, I have never been stung by a stinging insect until 3 years ago when we were looking to find our forever home at ACL. While we were looking at a lot, walking in weeds, I felt the worst pain on my leg. Little did I know, it most likely was not a bee sting, because according to my research, it was more likely a wasp, mud dauber or a yellow jacket. (Needless to say, we happily purchased a home at ACL instead of that lot!)

A few fun facts for us to "bee educated": (according to NASA and compiled by Texas A&M and FAO)

Bees have 5 eyes, bees are insects with 6 legs, male bees in the hive are called drones, bees fly about 20 mph, female bees in the hive *except the queen are called worker bees, number of eggs laid by queen is 2,000 per day, losing its stinger will cause a bee to die, bees have been here for about 30 million years, bees carry pollen on their



hind legs in a pollen basket or corbicula, an average beehive can hold about 50,000 bees, foragers must collect nectar from about 2 million flowers to make 1 pound of honey, the average per capita of honey consumption in the US is 1.3 pounds, bees have two pairs of wings, the principal form of communication among honeybees is through chemicals called pheromones and bees are important because they pollinate approximately 130 agricultural crops in the US fruit, fiber, nut, and vegetable crops. Bee pollination adds approximately \$1.4 billion dollars annually to improved crop yield and quality.

According to bee experts at the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, a third of the world's food production depends on bees. When animals and insects pick up the pollen of flowers and spread it, they allow plants, including many food crops, to reproduce.

Bee keepers can obtain 50-60 lbs. of honey from a single honey bee hive. That is a lot of nourishment!

We look forward to celebrating bees at our Garden Club "Bee Kind" Luncheon on Friday, May 17 in collaboration with World Bee Day 2024 on Monday, May 20 which

The New Year Brings a New Law

A new Illinois law that became effective on January first is providing patients with cranial facial anomalies and their families something to smile about. For some time now, I have been covering the efforts of organized dentistry to pass legislation that would require all group and individual health care plans to cover medically necessary care and treatment of craniofacial anomalies. At the state level, these efforts have resulted in passage of Illinois **Bill Number** HB4349, which now requires health insurance companies that cover newborn infants with congenital defects to also cover the treatment of cranial facial anomalies.

Cleft lip and cleft palates, collectively referred to as orofacial clefts, are common birth defects, occurring in 1-2 of every thousand births. As the body forms during pregnancy, cells from each side of the head grow toward the center, where they join to

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make the face. Normally, between weeks 4-7 of gestation the upper lip fuses. Between weeks 6-9 the palate fuses. Cleft lips and/or cleft palates occur when a baby's lips and/or palate do not form properly or fuse completely before birth. Cleft lips can range from a small slit to a large defect that extends into the nose. They can occur on one or both sides of the upper lip and, very rarely, in the middle. They can occur with or without a cleft palate.

Cleft palates also vary from occurring in only part of the palate to involvement in both the hard and soft palate and may be accompanied by additional defects in the inner ear. A cleft palate can occur alone or in conjunction with a cleft lip.

The roof of your mouth, or palate, is made up of a bony or hard palate in the front and a soft palate in the back, which contains muscles and tissues. The hard palate supports the teeth, and the soft palate assists in swallowing, breathing and speech. Complications from orofacial clefts will vary depending on the extent of the defect or defects, but usually include feeding difficulties, ear infections and hearing loss, speech and language issues, dental problems and growth and development issues.

While surgery to correct a cleft lip generally takes place around three months, surgery to repair a cleft palate is usually performed between 9-12 months. Some procedures may be required prior to these surgeries to optimize results. Larger defects may also require bone grafting between 7-9 years of age. Orthognathic surgery to realign the jaw and more extensive plastic surgeries on the nose will not take place until the child has finished growing.

Although these types of birth defects interfere with a person's ability to eat, speak, hear, or breathe in a normal/functional manner, many insurance companies call this a "cosmetic" issue and refuse to cover any necessary reconstructive surgery. Often those insurance companies that concede to pay for the initial surgical repair will not pay for any further reconstructive procedures to improve function as the child grows.

Illinois **Bill Number** HB4349 now requires insurance companies to provide coverage for care and treatment of cleft lip and palate for children under the age of nineteen. This includes any necessary surgeries, services, and procedures to restore, improve and maintain vital functions, such as feeding and speech appliances, otolaryngology treatment (orofacial myofunctional, speech and language therapy), and orthodontic and prosthodontic treatment and management.

Life in the Snow

Hello Lake goers,

Winter has finally made its way here and seems to be sticking around. This time of year always seems to bring the joys of warm cups of cocoa, blankets and sitting by fireplaces. While this may be easy for us to do, unfortunately our furry and feathered friends don't get those comforts. Though many head south, the others tough it out and brace for the cold winter days ahead. From stock pilling during the warm seasons to browsing around in the snow, our outdoor friends seem to know how to make it through. Listed below are some of the ways animals get through the cold months, some may seem more favorable while others seem unreal.

Migration... Seems like the easiest way to beat the cold, right? Well, depends on if you are walking or flying. This is what you see many animals start to do when the leaves have dropped, and winter chills start to set in. Animals can travel hundreds of thousands of miles just to feel the warm breeze. The monarch butterfly for instance can travel up to 3000 miles during their migration, with an average of 50-100 miles per day! The caribou also have been known to travel over 2000 miles as well. While these are the more extreme ones many tend to just travel far enough to get out of the cold.

Dormancy... This often seems like a neat way to let the cold days pass by. Stuff yourself all summer and fall just to sleep it off during the winter. However, there are a few different ways an animal can go dormant. Hibernation is the most common, where the animal lowers its body temperature and slows their heart rate to conserve more energy. Torpor is similar to hibernation, but these animals will actually wake up every now and then to eat and hunt if needed. The last two are more geared towards cold blooded animals and insects. Brumation happens in cold-blooded animals, where they slow their heart rate and temperature way down and sometimes stop them all together. Some of these animals can even survive being frozen for a period of time! Diapause occurs in many insects, where all their functions stop until things warm up again.

Adapt... This is for the animals that decide that they're not going to pack up or store up for winter. They tough it out and make the most of the winter months. From growing an extra layer of fur or feathers to changing the color of themselves. The birds that hang around will add an extra layer of feathers and will tend to puff up to stay warm. Feathers are one of the best insulators around and can keep the air trapped close to their bodies. Also, if you have dogs that spend a lot of time outside in the winter

months, you may notice their coats are a bit thicker than usual. This is often called their winter coat, which grows to keep them warmer. It's like throwing a nice thick sweater under your jacket before heading outside.

Each one of these ways has its pros and cons and I'm sure we know what one we would choose if we had to. Animals have adapted to their choice and have honed it down to be the most efficient way possible, whether it's knowing when to start heading south or where the best food can be found. They all know what to do when the time comes. Though I would like to throw a bit of caution out there as we may not know what the weather has in store for us in future years. With temperatures fluctuating and weather patterns becoming more extreme, these can affect some of the animals in different ways. If it warms up too much too soon and then drops back down to freezing temps, animals may wake up from dormancy and not be prepared for the sudden shock of cold temps. Some animals that change color to blend with the snow may stick out if there is not enough snow cover. Others that rely on snow fall to travel or even build homes may not be able to with some areas not receiving enough snow during the winter. That and with some seasons not lasting as long as they have before may send animals back sooner. Which may not be a problem for the older ones that know what to do, but the younger ones may miss out on the indicators.

Winter is here and will be sticking around for a while. Hopefully this sheds some light on some of the ways animals spend their winter days. From waking up for a mid-winter snack, settling down where the weather is warmer, or trudging through the snow to see what they can find. Animals are amazing creatures when it comes to getting through the cold winter days.

Stay warm out there now!



Tri-State Forest Stewardship Conference offers landowners opportunity to learn about forestry and conservation practices

The Tri-State Forest Stewardship Conference has a 25+ year tradition of providing great information and resources to forest landowners in the Illinois/Iowa/Wisconsin tri-state area. It has been one of the largest conferences for forest landowners in the Midwest.

We are happy to announce that Tri-State will return to its historic format on March $2^{\rm nd}$, 2024, in northwestern Illinois (Freeport) from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm. This conference is sponsored by Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin Extension Services. This year's keynote speaker is Jason Meyer, executive director of the White Oak Initiative. Jason will discuss the importance of white oak ecologically and economically along with efforts underway to sustain white oaks on the landscape. Other topics on the agenda include bottomland forest management, timber harvesting, forest taxes, invasive species control, prescribed fire, tree diseases and pathogens, wildlife management, tree physiology, streambank erosion, forest soils, tree identification, and silvopasture.

The day will end with a discussion with experts from each of the state's Extension professionals on the state of forestry in the tri-state area.

MIDWEST MEDICAL CENTER MEDICAL EDUCATION FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

There are five loan/scholarship programs available through Midwest Medical Center to provide financial assistance to persons pursuing an education in a medical field at an accredited school of the student's choice.

These programs have been made available to area students by seven benefactors: W. Clifford Stauss, C. Palmer and Eunice Eustice, Josephine Harvey, Richard and Marilyn Eastman, and Melvin E. Young.

Persons planning to enter careers in nursing, physical therapy, medicine, dentistry, as well as careers in related technical fields, such as radiology, laboratory, or some other qualifying medical profession are eligible to apply.

If the student, upon graduation from their health career program is employed at Midwest Medical Center for a period of time equivalent to the number of years financial assistance was received, the money becomes a scholarship and does not have to be repaid. If the graduate either chooses to work elsewhere or if no position is available at Midwest Medical Center in their field, the money becomes a loan; however, the annual interest rate is only 3%.

The education monies are administered in accordance with the wishes of the donors of the funds.

Money is awarded to successful applicants who meet the criteria established for each fund/donor.

All loan/scholarship applications must be submitted to the Hospital by noon on March 22, 2024.

The <u>Loan-Scholarship</u> programs listed below are provided by Midwest Medical Center and its benefactors:

W. Clifford Stauss, C. Palmer & Eunice Eustice, Josephine Harvey, Richard and Marilyn Eastman, and Melvin E. Young, to provide financial assistance to persons pursuing an education in a medical field at an accredited school of the student's choice.

- STAUSS MEDICAL LOAN-SCHOLARSHIP: Qualifying education programs are registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, x-ray technician, laboratory technologist or technician, or other similar related technical occupations in the medical field. Up to \$2,500 per student per 12-month school year for up to four years may be awarded.
- HARVEY MEDICAL LOAN-SCHOLARSHIP: Qualifying educational programs are registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, x-ray technician, laboratory technologist or technician, or other similar related health occupations. Up to \$2,500 per student per 12-month school year may be awarded.
- EASTMAN MEDICAL LOAN-SCHOLARSHIP: Qualifying education programs are the same as those for the Stauss program, excluding chiropractic and veterinary medicine. Up to \$5,000 per student per 12-month school year for up to five years may be awarded. Medical school students may receive up to \$10,000 per year for a maximum of four years.
- EUSTICE MEDICAL LOAN-SCHOLARSHIP: Nursing and medical technology students are eligible for up to \$5,000 per student per year for a maximum of four years. Medical school students are eligible for a maximum of \$10,000 per year for up to five years. Loan-Scholarships are awarded to Jo Daviess County residents only.
- YOUNG MEDICAL LOAN-SCHOLARSHIP: Qualifying education programs are registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, x-ray technician, laboratory technologist or technician, or other similar related technical occupations in the medical field. Up to \$2,500 per student per 12-month school year for up to four years may be awarded.

Upon graduation from technical school, college or medical residency, each twelve months' work, full-time at Midwest Medical Center, the amount of one year's loan-scholarship for each program (concurrently) with interest will be considered paid. Part-time employees will be credited toward repayment at the pro-rated rate of 2,080 paid hours, which equals one year of full-time employment.

If the loan is made to a health care professional who would not become a hospital employee after graduation, such as a physician or dentist, repayment of the loan similar to working here can be made by establishing an office practice in the hospital's immediate service area and becoming an active Medical-Dental Staff member or an Allied Health Professional Staff member.

If the person drops out of school or does not meet the criteria for repayment by employment or staff affiliation, repayment would be required to be made in the amount of at least \$50 per month plus interest of ½% per month (3% per year) on the unpaid balance. The amount of monthly repayment must be large enough so that repayment will be completed in no more than 10 years.

The Galena Lions Club Sight and Sound 2024 Scholarship

The Galena Lions Club Sight and Sound Scholarship has been established to provide financial assistance to a graduating high school senior or a current college student who resides in Jo Daviess County and is pursuing studies in the professions that aid the sight and hearing impaired. These professions may include, but are not limited to: Audiologist, Optometrist, Optician, Braille Instructor, Deaf School Teacher, or Optometry assistant.

Scholarships up to \$2,000 will be awarded. The scholarship is for payment towards a students tuition, textbooks, or other materials required by the school.

A new application must be submitted every year. Scholarship recipients cannot receive this scholarship for more than four years.

${\bf Scholar ship\ applicants\ must\ have\ the\ following:}$

- 1. Accepted for enrollment or presently enrolled in a field of study at a college, university, or other school, and either majoring or planning to major in the areas of sight or sound.
- 2. Have a current grade point average of 3.0 or higher (on a 4.0 scale).
- 3. Submit a letter to the committee (200-250 words) giving his/her reason for entering this field of study and list goals for after graduation in that field.
- 4. Provide references from three individuals (no relatives). At least two references must be high school or college instructors, high school or college counselors, or a present or past employer.
