Carmel Cottrell, Brian Holt, and Deb McNamee were elected. A big thank you to Mike Harris, Steve Borst, and Henry Doden for their time served on the board.

Some highlights from the July BOD meeting are:

- Approved the Multi-Sport Complex project, with a total cost of \$261,125. The first phase of project will start in 2023 with the previously approved \$245,000 of budgeted R&R funds. Phase 2 will be completed in Spring of 2024 with an additional \$16,125 coming from the 2024 budget.
- Approved additional dredging to be completed in Jefferson Cove, Hickory Cove, and a small cove in North Bay for an additional cost of \$38,675. The thought here is to take advantage of the equipment while we have it on site. The total cost of the dredging project is still under what we budgeted.

Dear Apple Canyon Lake,



The Apple Core is published by the ACLPOA for the benefit of its Members - to keep them informed about developments with respect to the lake, facilities, activities and finances; to report Board decisions; to provide a handy reference about rules, fees and coming events; and to afford a means of communication on questions and issues of importance to property owners.

The Editorial Review Committee shall consist of a member of the Board, who shall be the Chair; the General Manager, who shall be Vice-Chair; the Editor of The Apple Core, who shall be the Secretary; and such other members as the Board may appoint from time to time. This Committee shall prepare policies for the acceptance of material to be printed in The Apple Core, including, but not limited to, letters to the editor and policies for advertising material printed, which policies shall be submitted to the Board for approval annually.

The General Manager is responsible for having the paper produced. The Communications Director is the Editor. Any and all editorial material (copy other than paid advertising) must be submitted to the Editor's office.

The Editorial Review Committee will determine whether or not letters, advertising material or any other material submitted for publication should be rejected. If material is rejected, property owners will be notified and told cause of rejection.

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

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
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


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BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING MINUTES

ARCHITECTURAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL COMMITTEE MINUTES JUNE 3, 2023, APPROVED

Call to Order – Chairman Dave Allgood called the meeting to order at 8:02 am with the following committee members in attendance: Bill Ware, Dave Allgood, Bob Ballinger, and Henry Doden. Inspector Joe Wiener was also in attendance. John Anderson and Nolen Mullens attended via Zoom. Mike Harris and Jim Frank were absent

Approve Minutes of the May 2023 Meeting – Bob Ballenger Moved Henry Doden seconded. Motion Carried Unanimously.

Property Owner Comments – None

Building Inspector Report – 100 Residences were scheduled for septic inspections. The new Northstar System generated additional notices that were sent out in error. The Building Inspector is contacting these owners to notify them f the error.

The campground expansion proposal is being developed. Proposal calls for the removal of 10 existing primitive sites to be replaced with 10 new Improved sites with water and electric hookups. This project is included in the current Master Plan.

- 5.0 Approved/Adopt Minutes from the May 20, 2023 Meeting - Stephen Borst motioned to approve/adopt minutes from the May 20, 2023 Executive Session and Regular Meeting." Seconded by Bill Becker.
- 6.0 Treasurer's Report Treasurer's Report will be in The Apple Core.
- 7.0 Committee/Commission Reports

Sport Complex AdHoc - Gary Hannon reported that this is concerning that Multi-Sports Complex is not on the agenda. We continue to kick this can down the road. We have brought down this project to approximately \$50,000 less. Asked board for additional funding for this project. Desire to do demolition this fall and come back in spring 2024. Additional funds not to exceed \$60,000. Scott LoSasso - have gone back and looked at a few options. Resurface existing facility - asked Helm - won't do this, won't last and will degrade immediately. We did solicit bids to multiple vendors but hard to find people to do work. For this type of job, only game in town, and a good reputation. Instead of taking existing surface all the way down to base, and relaying the subsurface - they could reduce the cost by leveling to the existing base. Two inches instead of 3.5". Not the way they would engineer, but would be a good quality project. Good compromise. Other issue - bid has expired. Some extensions, but if not approved, we will have to rebid this. Bids will come in higher if we have to rebid. We've done a thorough job to get the best outcome. Please put this on the agenda.

Natural Resource Conservation Services attended their last meeting, Federal agency under the Department of Agriculture. Tyler is examining non-chemical ways to control algae in the lake and mechanisms to try to keep garbage in the corner out of Nixon Beach. Ordered fish stocking for fall. Completed first review on the greenway stewardship program.

Zebra Mussel – Bill Becker reported they met last Thursday. Applications from McCloud. July 12 will be first treatment; and 14 days later another treatment; 14 days later another treatment. More information will be in the Apple Seed, Apple Core, and Facebook.

Budget/Audit – Steve Borst reported they met a couple weeks ago. Final copies of the annual audit are available – clean opinion for the audit. Next meeting is July 28 to start the budget process.

Golf – Mary Hannon – The Big Cup on July 22. Only fundraiser is—improvements on the golf course.

Deer Management - Gordon Williams – archery range information. Questioning an agenda item today, 13.2, if that should be on the agenda. Was not presented to Rules & Regulations yet.

Legal – Sean Cottrell reported they met last month. Focusing on voting requirements for both documents. Discussion later today on the agenda from Legal – more requests for rewrites. Two new members – on next month's agenda.

Memorial Pavilion – Carmel Cottrell reported they are discussing bids and will present to board in July.

This can then be spelled out in governing documents. Next steps: discussion item today - if amenable, Legal can take this back and make it a formal

recommendation to the board. To support the rewrite of the Declaration and Bylaws. Period. Questions? Bob Ballenger - not of the opinion ACL has authority to be a police authority. Sean Cottrell - that is where there is a disconnect - group could be charged to clarify that. Can't go forward with rewriting the Declaration or Bylaws without that clarification. Looking to the Board to give direction to this group. Nolan Mullen - reactivate for the purpose of governing documents? Okay with that. Laura Pratt - So this will be a Safety Commission Ad Hoc just to align the governing document with, not to change anything in the Safety and Security Department? Sean—Yes. The responsibility of safety and security department are called out in the bylaws. Reactivate the group - solely focused on support for Legal for re-writing the bylaws and governing documents. Legal has determined that this should not be done by Legal. Previously voted down as seen as a group that will micromanage Safety and Security.

- Gather information and make recommendations to the board of directors on matters regarding the health safety and welfare of ACL membership (charge). We have three members to staff the commission. If approved in July, we will ask for more volunteers. John Anderson - will go to lawyers? Sean Cottrell - for document approval, generally supposed to be reviewed by Legal committee [commission]. Yes, supposed to go to both council and Legal Committee [Commission]. Ad Hoc commission and once done with final recommendation, would recommend disbanding. Focused on re-writing of declaration and bylaws.
- 14.4 2024 Plan on a Page Discussion: Steve Borst reported they met to discuss how to better align our long-range plan with the goals of our general manager. Came up with a revised planning process. In the past we would bring the Plan on a Page to the board in June or July for the next year. Then in December, board would write the goals for the general manager. So, there was a disconnect, might not be the same. Giving you the plan as a draft today. Review this and then could bring to budget and adjust accordingly. Not asking to approve the Plan on a Page, won't do that until we discuss goals for general manager.

ANNUAL TREASURER'S REPORT JULY 15, 2023

Summary of 2022 Year End Financial Results

From a financial standpoint, the lingering effects of the pandemic negatively impacted the Association in 2022 as labor shortages caused an unexpected rise in wages, and inflation was much higher than it has been for decades.

Efforts to control rising costs included increasing prices at some amenities including the Pro Shop food and beverage and golf course fees and more dramatically the decision to bring the Cove restaurant under house management. The results of these decisions will primarily flow into the 2023 financial results and need to be closely monitored as we try to stem the tide of increasing costs. The good news is that the Association ended the year in a financially sound place which included receiving a clean opinion of our Financial Statements as of December 31, 2022, from our auditors Catalano, Caboor & Co. Below are the 2022 financial highlights summarized by Fund.

Operating Fund

Operating Revenues of \$3,779,081 were \$295,514 higher than last year, primarily due to increases in dues and fees. Operating Expenses (excluding depreciation) were \$3,900,433 and \$326,103 higher than last year, primarily due to labor costs. Although The Fund earned \$14,070 in Interest Income and another \$42,938 from our Land Investment Properties, it did end 2022 with a Deficiency of Revenue Over Expenses before Depreciation of \$121,352. Depreciation for the year was \$626,747. The Operating Fund ended the year with a Cash Surplus of \$56,734, a Certificate of Deposit valued at \$278,415, Accounts Receivable of \$11,666 and Current Liabilities of \$238,142.

Replacement & Renovation (R&R) Fund

The 2022 R&R assessment totaled \$537,000. R&R Fund purchases of property improvements, equipment, and vehicles totaled \$466,823. Although overall the R&R spending was less than budgeted there are still 8 approved R&R projects totaling \$394,525 still in progress that have been carried over into 2023. Prior Year carryovers are Security Cameras (Phase 3) (\$15k), StarCom Radio Systems (\$25k), Multi-Sports Complex Renovation (\$243k), Paths to Boat Docks (\$20), Chip & Seal at Campground and Main Entrance to Clubhouse (\$28k), Watershed Erosion Control (\$2), Firehouse - Siding & Roof (\$40), Cove Walk-in Freezer (\$21k). These projects did have progress payments of \$53,941 to date, carried over as deposits on the year-end Balance Sheet. The Fund earned \$10,380 in interest and ended the year with a Fund Balance of \$1,450,686.

Capital Projects Fund

The 2022 Capital Projects assessment was \$500,000. Although the Fund spent only \$\$190,679 in 2022, funds are being accumulated in the Capital Projects Fund to help pay for Flood Mitigation (\$1.5M - \$2M), Contract Dredging (\$800k), and a Winchester Bay Redesign (\$320k). The Fund earned \$8,078 in interest and ended the year with a Fund Balance of \$1,905,858.

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








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

Each day started with a sing-along dance that had the kids dancing as beetles, grasshoppers, and bumblebees. Once they had loosened up and got out a little of their buggy energy, the kids engaged in a wide variety of games and activities to learn about the weird and wonderful world of insects.

A major highlight of the camp was amateur entomologist, Ethan Brown, a recent high school graduate. He amazed the kids with his insect collections. Almost all of the insects were collected in his own back yard in Savannah, and he showed the kids how he sets up a sheet with a blacklight to capture them. The next day the kids got to go out to try their own hand at using sweep-nets to collect bugs out of the natural area below the Children's Garden, with Ethan looking on to help them identify what they found. Everyone was sent home with a how-to guide on collecting insects in their own back yards.

The final day the focus was on Monarch Butterflies and the amazing migration they make from Mexico and back each year. The kids played a game where they were butterflies that tried to survive migration. ACL volunteer, Amy Guzman, brought in the butterflies that she had collected as eggs off of their host plants at the beginning of summer, and showed the kids the different stages of the butterfly life cycle. The camp culminated in a hike along the lake, where the kids looked for butterflies and identified the different plants that butterflies like. Life Jacket Loaner Program Promotes Safety at The Lake

The Children's Garden and Adventure Committee is teaming with the Safety & Security Department at Apple Canyon Lake this summer to promote safety information and to provide free life jackets to anyone.



Do you know how old you have to be to NOT wear a life jacket?

Illinois State law requires that anyone under the age of 13 must wear a life jacket while aboard any watercraft under 26 feet in length at all times the boat is underway, unless they are below deck in an enclosed cabin or operating on private property.

There will be two locations established soon displayed with the two logos above. One station will be at Nixon Beach Pavilion and the other will be at the outdoor area of the Marina building. Currently, we have plenty of life jackets to support both stations. More details to follow as the banners and life jackets are put in place.

Together with ACL, the Adventure Committee will utilize a variety of media and host public, in-person mini-lessons on water/lake/boat safety with Julie Janssen, our Safety & Security Manager. Julie is also an expert at inspecting life jackets, fitting life jackets, and with this new initiative, the Children's Adventure Committee will loan life jackets as well as provide important safety tips.

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NOTES FROM NATURAL RESOURCES

Hello lake goers,

Just wanted to give a quick update since it has been a while. With last week being a holiday week, we decided not to try and fight the boat traffic with the weed harvester, as it would have lost the fight. We did have a small engine trouble with the harvester this week, so we decided to keep the harvesting to a minimum to prevent anything bigger happening. The harvester was looked over, repaired, and is back up and running. The engine is still under warranty so no need to worry. We were able to harvest at Nixon Beach, Independence, and Hawthorne. Next week we will touch up Independence and Hawthorne quickly before moving around to the western and northern bays.

The zebra mussel shoreline treatment was done on Wednesday and completed that evening. The Canadian film crew Inspired Planet Productions was out on the lake filming their documentary called All Too Clear. The film crew is mainly documenting what is happening in the Great Lakes with zebra mussels but caught wind of our shoreline zebra mussel treatment and decided to film some scenes. Feel free to look them up and check out their trailer for the documentary. They seemed excited about our lake and had mentioned that the fish were rather curious about their underwater drone. The next two shoreline treatments are scheduled for July 26th and August 9th.

Also, one other note is that there are buoys out around the lake that are live zebra mussel cages so that we can test the effectiveness of the treatment. We ask you not to disturb them so that we can have an accurate view of the treatment results.

Zebra Mussel Shoreline Control Treatment Update

Friday July 7 Alan Cottrell, Norm Vandigo, and Allen Zobjeck placed eleven Treatment Cages containing live zebra mussels around the lake. These cages were placed at different depth levels into non-wake locations. McCloud Aquatics came in on Tuesday July 11 and installed another ten cages on the main lake body. All treatment cages were monitored to validate the treatment effectiveness the day after treatment. Dr. Hammond joined McCloud in inspecting the entire lake to ensure all areas were prepared for treatment. There were some areas that were not prepared properly by ACL and were bypassed from treatment.

On Wednesday July 12, five totes of product, 275 gallons each, were delivered for the entire project. 550 gallons total of EarthTec QZ was used at ACL on the first shoreline control treatment. The control treatment started on the afternoon of July 12. The entire process took two separate boats 8 hours to treat the entire shoreline. The process by McCloud utilized a combination of surface application, injection, and drop hoses, with extra attention given to docks, boat lifts, and swimming areas. Another member of the team consulting with McCloud Aquatics was John Cortell from Earth Lab Sciences. All consults like Dr. Hammond and John Cortell were done free of charge.


Zach Melnick and Yvonne Drebert of Inspired Planet documented the shoreline application process via video drones both in the air and underwater. ACL will be part of Inspired Planet's upcoming documentary "All to Clear." Information on the broadcast will be sent out when we know more details. Inspired Planet was able to retrieve many hours of underwater film footage documenting the state of the lake before, during, and after the treatment process. They are only here at ACL for the first treatment but are confident the footage will show a difference. Inspired Planet provided the videography free of charge to ACL, and they have made an incredible impact on this project. Thank You!

Friday July 14, some ACL volunteers investigated a couple treatment cages to validate the treatment process along with video recording from Inspired Planet. We did see mortality across the lake, which is good news for boat owners and swimmers along the shoreline. The dead mussels will decay in time but are still sharp, so please wear swim socks to avoid injury. Dr. Hammond and McCloud Aquatics will be reviewing these results in order to make further changes to the application processes coming up. Dr. Hammond has said that it will take approximately 10 days for this first application to be fully effective and kill zebra mussels in the lake. We will review and restock the treatment cages prior to the start of the next two applications.


We would like to thank all property owners for staying off the lake during the application process so

this process could be performed without interruption. The next two shoreline treatments are July 26 and August 9 when the same process will be followed. The next two treatments will split three totes of product, 412 gallons of EarthTec QZ, for each treatment.

Stay tuned for further updates as the summer progresses. And once again, thank you all for your patience and understanding as we work to remove the zebra mussels from our wonderful Apple Canyon Lake!








Phase I Results from the Shoreline Cage Monitoring after First Treatment

The following is the Treatment Cage Monitor Information from the first phase of our ACL Zebra Mussel Shoreline Control process. Listed below are cages that were staged around the lake with live zebra mussels in them. They were opened, with results recorded (see below), then fresh live zebra mussels were placed into the cages for the next treatment phase on July 27. We would like to note that looking down into the water onto the rocks, we can see that there are large amounts of dead zebra mussels. This is all good and is telling us that the treatment is working.

During each of the treatment processes, the lake will not be closed, but we do ask that if all possible, property owners refrain from boating on those days, or at least for a few hours while the application process is taking place. Also, if you do decide to go on the lake, please specifically avoid the area where the work boat is and do not interrupt or stop the workers to talk. Yolunteers will be on the lake to remind boaters to stay away from the treatment area. Avoiding the areas of active application will give the product an opportunity to start working to kill Zebra Mussels. The success of this process is important to all of us at ACL.
