from the president...

It is with great mixed emotion that ACLPOA has announced the closing of The Cove Restaurant. As difficult of a decision that it was, the Board found that it was a sound financial decision for the membership.

The Board would like to express its sincerest thanks and deepest appreciation to the entire Cove staff, all the great volunteer efforts from the Cove Ad Hoc Commission, our membership, and all the loyal Cove customers. The future plans for The Cove have not been

determined at this time; however, we will keep you informed as we move forward.

At the October board meeting, the Board approved publishing the 2024 budget and fee schedule in the upcoming edition of The Apple Core. The Budget Commission submitted a handful of budget recommendations for the Board to consider. These recommendations were largely tied to whether the Pro Shop or The Cove remained open through the winter. The Board voted to close The Cove with a 5-3 vote, and subsequently to publish the budget recommendation that reflected The Cove being closed for the winter. What will likely jump out at you is the proposed fifteen percent dues assessment increase. The Board will continue to review the budget and look for means to lower the proposed increase before adopting the budget at the December meeting.

There has been some discussion concerning the dredge and the possibility of selling it. Questions that arise include the need for the dredge if we continue with contract dredging? If we sell it, the funds could be applied towards other projects etc. If it is sold, it would also be removed from the reserve study, which means we wouldn't have to continue saving for its future replacement. Mike Harris will be checking to see what the value of the dredge is and report back to the Board to consider the options.

As you know the lake level is being lowered this year as a test, and next for

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

the upcoming spillway project. The Board has temporarily approved the storage of shore stations on the nearby greenway areas. This will allow property owners who want to take their shore station out of the water a quicker and easier way to so if they desire. The shore stations must be removed from the greenway in the Spring of 2024 and 2025.

Finally, the Memorial Pavilion Project is moving along swiftly. The concrete has been poured and the electricity will be run in the coming weeks. The Memorial Pavilion Ad Hoc plans to have the pathway pavers sent out over winter for engraving and we should see the pathway form in early spring of 2024.

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

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BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING MINUTES

ARCHITECTURAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL COMMITTEE MINUTES SEPTEMBER 9, 2023 APPROVED

- 1.0 Call to Order Chairman Dave Allgood called the meeting to order at 8:00 am with the following committee members in attendance: Bill Ware, Dave Allgood, Kevin Rodgers, Mark Kosko, Bill Becker, and Nolan Mullen. Inspector Joe Wiener was also in attendance. John Anderson and Bob Ballinger attended via Zoom. Jim Frank was absent. Guest – Steve Malone
- 2.0 Approve Minutes of the August 5, 2023 Meeting Nolan Mullen Moved Bill Becker seconded. Motion Carried Unanimously.
- 3.0 Property Owner Comments None
- 4.0 Building Inspector Report 207 Septic inspections were scheduled for this year and only 11 remain on the noncompliance list. Joe will contact these owners. 2 septic systems did not pass inspection and were upgraded and repaired.

107 permits have been approved so far this year. There were 104 permits approved last year at this time.

As per the submitted documents, in accordance with ACL Code 110.4.E., to reset an existing attached352-gsf paved stone patio and expand it by 460-gsf (combined equals 812-gsf) encroaching approximately 5' into the side yard setback. Also, to construct a new detached 227-gsf chip stone fire pit within the 100' lake set back area. Lot corner posts and structure

setbacks must be located and flagged by a licensed surveyor in accordance with ACL Code 102.4 for verification by the ACL Building Inspector. Where appropriate, silt fencing shall be installed and maintained throughout the project until the ground cover is restored. Disturbed ground shall be seeded and mulched as soon as is practical. No variance is granted.

Motion – Bill Ware Second – Bill Becker – Discussion: Meets all ACL Requirements and Setbacks Motion Passed 8 Ayes and 0 Nay.

7.2 – To permit the replacement of the decking, balusters and railings to meet code on an existing 230-gsf attached deck, and the demolition of the existing stairs and the replacement of the stairs tomeet Code. The replacement stairs will encroach into the side yard setback area.
Materials willbe tan composite decking, white railings and white balusters. The footprint of the deck will notincrease in size. Disturbed ground shall be seeded and mulched as soon as is practical. JoDaviess County Planning and Development permits must be issued before the ACL permit willbe considered issued. No variance is granted. The 2'-6" stair encroachment into the side yardsetback is approved in accordance with ACL Code 110.4 E.

The finishes are tomatch the existing dwelling, The lot corner posts and structure setbacks must be located and flagged by alicensed surveyor in accordance with ACL B& E Code 102.4. A silt fence shall be installed andmaintained throughout the project until the ground cover is restored. Disturbed ground shall be seededand mulched as soon as is practical. A refundable \$500.00 Environmental Debris Bond is required. JoDaviess County Planning and Development permits and the Health Department permit must be issuedbefore the ACL permit will be considered issued. No variance is granted.

The Jo Daviess County Planning andDevelopment permits and the Thompson Township Road District culvert and ROW approval must beissued before the ACL permit will be considered issued. Recording results - saw millions of dead zebra mussels all over the bottom of the lake. saved the lake but the clarity of the lake is lowered. We have a clarity test coming up next week. We have to stay vigilant and continue to look at docks, boats and shoreline. Looking for people to give us information if they see zebra mussels on their boats, etc. Would like to thank the ad hoc commission for moving forward with the process we put forth to the board and congratulate the board for stepping up and taking this on, also thanking the homeowners as well. Inspired Plant Productions document out in 2024 and Galena Gazette writing an article, co-author a grant presented to the IL Legislature. Final recommendation - done smartly so we can adjust downward on what we have to do next year. Deb McNamee thank you to AI for everything he has done.

Lake Carroll has a four foot drawdown every year. Will be an article in next month's Apple Core. Backup valve approval – if approved later on today, will be installed before this drawdown.

Sports Complex – Gary Hannon reported they are still pending a final approved contract. Planning to demolish and reconstruct the asphalt for the sports complex in October.

Security watches this closely. Program is handled very well. Why would a hunter not sign themselves out? Two hunters in one zone, emergency call, one can sign out both. Does not happen a lot. Only using the app for signing in, not signing out. Motion carried with Bob Ballenger and Bill Becker voting nay.

Mark Kosco motioned "to suspend Roberts Rule of Order." Seconded by John Anderson, motion carried unanimously.

13.3 Food & Beverage Commission Proposal - Bill Bourell - co-chair Food & Beverage Commission reported on where they are at today. Original goals - great customer experience with great menu. We were also committed to making our employee experience exceptional. Where do we stand - three managers in 4.5 months, 2nd GM. Not where we need to be. Dave Lyng, Cove Ad Hoc Commission - great potential for what lies ahead. There is a gap, however. Still an opportunity to get to where we need to be. We are asking someone to come in with experience both in business and managing. Mike Ward would be able to bring this to us. Bill Bourell - the Cove is one of the most important amenities here, next to the lake. Process question - Brian Holt asked were bids made? We did not go out for bids. Brian Holt - heard several times - volunteers are great. Bill Bourell - but we can't operate a business strictly with volunteers. Dave Lyng - timing is the issue - we are going into the off season. Amount of time invested has been expediential – if we don't get it right now, could take us three years to fix. Fix what should have been established at the beginning. Mark Kosco – would like to see (comparing apples to apples) is a specific example of a before he came in to an operation and after when he left - what those actual results were. Commission is asking for 20,000 for a consultant. Not within the approved budget. On top of a projected loss for the Cove, add another 20,000. Bill Bourell - Mike's background specifically speaks to what we want him to do. He has started and developed and sold in profit multiple businesses. 20+ year member of this lake, vested in doing what needs to be done here. Nolan Mullen commission did a great job as a whole. Why did it take until September for people to realize there were problems. Bill Bourell - through the journey we had all agreed upon at the meetings, we were going in one direction, and leadership went in another direction. Until leadership changed (recent), we are finally getting the voice back. So much ability to hold others accountable. Laura Pratt what are the expected hours behind the scenes, working remotely vs. actually being down there. Bill Bourell - Mike Ward is traveling right now, but he does agree, if the board does not feel his services are being provided as such, we can be done. Physically on site vs. working from afar, not sure of the percentages of that. Mike offered very early

on to previous leadership, to be involved. That was not considered or discussed or negotiated. We wouldn't be here if we would have gotten his help then. Mary Hannon - not exactly sure how much startup money we've used. We should know how much money we have spent. Nolan Mullen – we are all actively asking those questions. Bills are still coming in.

Mike Ward joined the meeting via Zoom. Addressing the comment about the ship sinking – not sinking but has a lot of holes in it. Fix the ship or continue with the holes and lose money. Way in which we get that done, work over the next few months to work with F&B management team/ commission/staff/Ashlee/Mark to institutionalize what we should have done at the very beginning. We had a plan to set up the Cove a certain way. Get back to the original plan that was laid out and when we do that, the holes will be filled. Delay – if you want to continue to bleed, go ahead and delay. Stop the bleeding and go into the new season (May 1) where we are not losing money. We have an opportunity/time now to fix this. Spent 50 years helping organizations do exactly this.

Bob Ballenger motioned "to reinstate Roberts Rule of Order." Seconded by Laura Pratt, motion carried unanimously.

Mark Kosco motioned "to approve the F&B Operations Optimization proposal submitted by Mike Ward, that provides contract professional services to complete the execution of setting up The Cove & Pro Shop under the management of the ACLPOA." Seconded by Brian Holt. Discussion: how do we intend to pay for this? Funds in remaining startup costs or over the cost of what is in the budget. Would be about \$12,000 for this budget year. Likely still remaining in the startup costs. Roll call: Deb McNamee - nay; Bill Becker - yea; Laura Pratt - nay; John Anderson - nay; Mark Kosco - yea; Brian Holt - yea; Bob Ballenger nay; Carmel Cottrell - nay. Motion fails with five nays.

 Deb McNamee motioned "to table this agenda item."
 Seconded by Bob Ballenger, motion carried unanimously.
- 13.5 Tree Care Service Bob Ballenger motioned "to approve the proposed contract between ACLPOA and Mullen Tree Care Service." Seconded

by John Anderson. Discussion: Mike Harris reported he contacted Mullen and he agreed to help us if we have greenway stewardship program and mark our hardwood trees. Consider this communication as notice required by Section 1-30(B) of the Illinois Common Interest Community Association Act of the Board's decision to approve of the agreement with Mullen's Tree Care and was submitted and included in the Board packet. Notice will also be in The Apple Core. Two-year term, under \$5,000 per year. Motion carried unanimously.

- 13.6 Backup Valve Bob Ballenger motioned "to approve the proposal from Molitor for \$23,816 which includes valve, labor and material for installation for the dam back up valve." Seconded by Bob Ballenger. Discussion: valve next to the valve already installed. The plan is to have this installed before the drawdown. Motion carried unanimously.
- 14.0 Property Owners Comments

Henry Doden, 13A129 – Property Owner comments are so people can comment on what is on the agenda. Having PO comments at the end defeats that. Not proper. No money was budgeted for The Cove. Illegal. Nolan Mullen – property owner comments – does not specify where it has to be on the agenda. Everyone had a chance to speak today.

Mary Hannon, 239 Washington Lane – as a member of both F&B commissions, expressing her sincere disappointment that you are not willing to keep this beautiful amenity alive. Only option to make this work. We believe we can make it work, not giving us the opportunity.

Gary Hannon, 239 Washington Lane – interesting to see what this board plans to do with the Cove. If not closing, what are you going to do? PO Comments at the end – allows us to hear what the board approves, etc.

Terese Nelson – agree that you are not supporting the Cove. Should be done. Currently President of the Garden Club – we work closely with the board to get things done. As you walk up to the Children's Garden, does not look good. No money, but we will make it happen. We are all in this together. The Cove will survive.

Crystal Erdenberger, 7A189 - close one or the other – don't close down things that are working.

Bob Ballenger motion to adjourn, seconded from John Anderson at 11:14 am.

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

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

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ACL'S PICKLEBALL REVIVAL AT THE MULTI SPORTS COMPLEX

In our beautiful community of Apple Canyon Lake, amidst the serene beauty of nature, a transformation is underway, centered around the sport that's sweeping the nation: pickleball.

Pickleball at Apple Canyon Lake has a history that dates back to 2017 when two pickleball courts were ingeniously "taped out" on the tennis courts by Rick Paulson, John Diehl, and Pete Campbell. These pioneers of the sport introduced pickleball to the community, setting the stage for what would become a beloved pastime.

Pete Campbell, in particular, played a significant role in these early days. He not only helped create the courts but also took on the role of instructor. Pete hosted pickleball clinics to teach residents how to play, spreading the joy of this fast-paced and engaging sport throughout the community.

Apple Canyon Lake's pickleball courts, at the multi sports complex believed to be as old as the community itself, have seen better days. Over the years, these courts have suffered from disrepair, plagued by dead spots on the playing surface, making it challenging for pickleball enthusiasts to enjoy their favorite pastime.

Recognizing the need for change, an Ad Hoc commission was formed in February 2022, marking the beginning of a journey to revitalize the community's facilities at the multi sports complex. This endeavor was not just about replacing the aging courts; it was about breathing new life into a cherished activity.

The history of these courts, striped out on the multi sports complex surface, runs deep, dating back almost half a century. They had been resurfaced once before but had relied on a series of "Band-Aid" fixes to keep them in play. However, as pickleball became the fastest-growing sport in the United States, it was clear that something more substantial was needed.

The project was divided into phases, with Phase 1 commencing on September 26, 2023. It involved the removal of the existing asphalt, fencing, and poles. It was then compacted and the area regraded, adding an additional 2.5 inches of gravel. It will be topped off with 3 inches of high-grade tennis court mix asphalt. To ensure player safety and court boundaries, a 10-foot fence will also be slated for installation.

Demolition work was entrusted to Helm/Civil Group, a company with a proven track record in the area, having completed numerous projects around the lake, including work at Krape Park in Freeport and pickle ball courts at the Galena Territories.

Phase 2 is scheduled for the spring of 2024, where the finishing touches will be added. This includes top coating and striping, with the aim of completing the project by early June, weather permitting.

In an effort to maximize resources, the project plans to reuse the existing basketball poles and tennis court poles. The multi-sport complex will boast a tennis court, volleyball and basketball hoops as well as four permanent pickleball courts designed to meet the growing demand of this rapidly expanding sport.

Fred Kolkmann, a professional consultant from Grafton, Wisconsin, played a pivotal role in designing and creating schematics for the project. His expertise helped guide the transformation of these aging courts.

But the story doesn't end there. Phase 3, expected to take place in 2024, promises to bring even more improvements to the community's complex. Plans include the addition of benches, bench shade covers, windscreens to protect against the elements, and extra equipment to enhance the playing experience. A parking area expansion is also under consideration.

The renovation of the multi sports complex at Apple Canyon Lake is more than just a construction project; it's a testament to the community's commitment to fostering a vibrant, active, and inclusive environment for pickleball, basketball and tennis enthusiasts. These revitalized courts will not only provide a better playing experience but will also serve as a hub for social interactions, where residents can come together, make memories, and celebrate their love for these sports.

As the transformation unfolds, excitement builds in anticipation of the day when the first serve is made on these new courts. Apple Canyon Lake's pickleball facilities are on the verge of a remarkable renaissance, and the community can't wait to rally around its beloved sport.







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
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



Notes from Natural Resources

Recently Asked Questions about the Proposed Lake Lowering:

Q: Will every dock configuration and the way they are attached to shore be able to handle a 2' drawdown in 2023?


A: Every dock has been surveyed for potential problems. While we cannot say all docks will be okay during a 2' drawdown, most should be ok. We will have a group of volunteers monitoring and reporting any concerns. If you have any concerns about your private dock, you might want to consider having it detached and tied away from shore. See other questions posted on dock concerns.

Q: What will happen to docks when they are down 2' or more and the lake freezes before refilling?

A: We do not expect that this will occur during the 2" drawdown. The lake will only remain lowered for about a week before it begins to return to its normal level. Based on what is observed during this trial and additional consideration, we hope to have more guidance for a greater drawdown next year, if needed.

Q: What recommendations will ACL supply to owners on what to do with different dock configurations and shore attachments when lake drawdown occurs in 2023.

A: Each owner is responsible for their own dock and if you are concerned, reach out to the marina of your choice for assistance. ACL cannot touch your dock without written permission. Even then we have a limited labor force. However, we may be able to supply names and numbers of outside contractors.



Flood Mitigation Update – Lake Lowering During Week of November 13, 2023

As previously noted, the ACLPOA is moving forward with dam and spillway improvements which will meet current Illinois Department of Natural Resources regulations for dam safety of existing dams. Most of this work will be conducted in the fall and winter of 2024. Based on communications with our engineers, we expect that the lake will have to be lowered next fall to complete this project. However, the exact amount of lowering and its duration will ultimately depend on the specific contractors chosen for this project. That will not be known until later this year. However, to anticipate any issues that might arise, we are planning a small drawdown this fall.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

- A 2-ft drawdown will be initiated during the week of November 13, 2023, by opening the valve to the pipe that passes under the dam.
- A backup valve will have been installed by the end of October and this will also be tested.
- This drawdown should take 2-3 days during which time volunteers will monitor and document any issues observed.
- The valve will be open 24 hours per day during the drawdown and will create a considerable current at the discharge pipe into Hells Branch Creek. Concrete obstacles have been placed at the discharge site to minimize erosion. However, for your safety we ask everyone to stay away from this area and the nearby Harold Bathum Trail. There may also be a slight 'sulfur' odor, but this is expected.
- We will be able to stop the drawdown at any time if any serious issues occur.
- We anticipate the 2-ft drop will remain for several days or until the entire lake is inspected.
- The lake will remain open during this time, but we want to ask everyone to remain vigilant and use common sense. The lower portions of boat ramps are VERY slimy and will be VERY slippery.
- Once the testing is completed, the valve will be mostly closed but may remain partially open to allow some water to flow into Hells Branch Creek to maintain its integrity. The lake will naturally return to its normal level in about 6 weeks depending on the amount of rainfall we receive during this time.
- Part of this test is to determine the drawdown and refill rates for the lake.

DOCKS:

- We have 101 association docks with 844 slips and 182 private docks on the lake. Volunteers have currently spent over 104 hours surveying these docks to determine whether any issues may arise during the drawdown. By the time you read this article they will have finished surveying every dock for potential concerns.
- We anticipate very few issues with this drawdown but, if any arise, the rate of drawdown can be reduced.
- Be aware that dock gangplanks may become steeper with the drawdown and may become less stable. It may be best to stay off them unless absolutely necessary.
- Boat lifts, e.g., ShoreStations, etc., should remain stable with the drawdown but may not be usable for boats due to the lowered water level.

BOATS:

- Kevin of K&S marina is aware of the drawdown and the need to get boats off the lake by early November, especially those in shallow waters.
- Each owner is responsible for their own boat. If you use a marina service other than K&S and your boat is still in the water, make sure your marina service is aware of this.

OTHER:

• Questions are being solicited. Use the QR code elsewhere in the paper to ask any questions about the Flood Mitigation project and look for the answer on our website.

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



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LAKE LOWERING THIS NOVEMBER!

This November, Maintenance, Natural Resource and Security personnel, as well as Volunteers from the Flood Mitigation Commission will open the valve located under the grate just south of the middle of the dam to begin draining the lake into Hells Branch Creek.

Goals:

- to lower the lake 2 feet (This is estimated to take 2-4 days. This reduction will be maintained for a short period of time, to inspect the lake area for possible problems, and then the valve will be partially closed to return the lake to its normal level.
 - The purposes of this exercise are as follows:
- Determine the length of time to lower the lake level by 2 ft.
- Determine how the valve opening can be adjusted to maintain this lake level given that water is constantly flowing into the lake from various streams.
- Determine how the valve opening can be adjusted to return the lake to its normal level while still maintaining some flow into Hells Branch Creek.
- Testing a backup valve which will be installed prior to lake lowering.
- Determine any other issues that might arise from lowering the lake level, e.g. docks, etc.

IN*CI*DENTAL*LY *Pierre Fauchard: Proving the Existence of Root Pulp to Save Teeth*

Inside your tooth, beneath the enamel and a hard layer called dentin, is soft tissue called the pulp. The pulp contains blood vessels, nerves, and connective tissues. When the pulp of the tooth becomes inflamed and is left untreated, it can become infected, or abscessed, and die. While this is common knowledge today, when surgical dentist Dr. Pierre Fauchard proved the existence of the root pulp within each tooth in 1723 it was a scientific breakthrough.

For much of history dentistry was barbaric. Lack of basic knowledge about oral anatomy, living tissues and what causes oral diseases meant most people believed in the superstition that tiny worms invaded the mouth and caused teeth to rot. Practicing dentistry required no specific education and treatment mainly consisted of extracting teeth rather than trying to preserve them. As anesthesia was not yet invented, treatment standards were not set, the need for sterilization was not understood and dental extraction instruments were not yet invented, this was often a crude and painful experience that could lead to infection and death. Pierre Fauchard was instrumental in changing dentistry into the science-based profession it is today.

Fauchard was only fifteen years old when he joined the French Navy. During the three years that he served as a ship doctor he witnessed the incredible amount of damage that Scurvy, a condition caused by a severe lack of vitamin C, caused to his fellow sailor's oral health. Upon leaving the Navy, he set up a dental practice at the University of Angers Hospital, two-hundred miles southwest of Paris. Fauchard considered teeth important for health, speech, and appearance. He believed in saving teeth, not extracting them. He studied diligently and sought out colleagues who were like minded in wanting to improve dental health. He began to refine current dental techniques and develop new ones. His work with microscopes helped him demonstrate that acids derived from sugar, not tiny worms, were the cause of tooth decay. He developed his own instruments to remove decay and created filling materials. While it was common practice for a dentist to sit on the patient's chest with their head between his legs during dental procedures, Fauchard provided his patients with a comfortable horsehair chair. Rather than facing the patient and blocking the light necessary to clearly visualize the oral cavity, Fauchard taught the value of working from behind to his colleagues.

In 1718 Fauchard moved to Paris. There he discovered that the world's leading medical libraries had very few textbooks on dentistry and the ones that did exist were of poor quality. Fauchard believed that education was the only way to fight superstition, misinformation, and the dangerous and deceptive "treatments" being touted by barbers and others who called themselves dentists. So, he set about to write a comprehensive "teaching" book on the practice of dentistry.

Fauchard was a humble man who understood the power of collaboration. He secured no less than nineteen physicians and surgeons for their contributions, opinions, review, and approval throughout his entire process of researching, writing, and editing his landmark book entitled: *Le chirurgien dentiste* (*The Surgeon Dentist*), pub. in 1728.

The Surgeon Dentist was the first scientific text that defined a systematic, scientific, and comprehensive system for caring and treating teeth. The book included full descriptions of the anatomy of teeth, diagnosis and treating oral disease, details about dental instruments and how to best utilize them, classification of over 100 dental diseases, case studies and illustrations, a description of a root canal detailing removal of diseased pulp, cleaning and obturation, revolutionary techniques to create and place dentures and other prosthetics, and surgical removal of tumors and lesions of the oral cavity. Instruments and techniques to remove tartar from teeth and other ways to help prevent dental disease were also introduced. News of the book spread quickly and soon became the foundation for dental education.

While the techniques to perform a root canal have improved with modern technology, we can thank Pierre Fauchard for saving millions of teeth from needless extraction by root canal treatment that can remove the infected pulp, disinfect, fill, seal, and save the natural tooth.



Fishers & Farmers Priority Watershed Selected as 2023 National Waters to Watch

<u>Fishers and Farmers Partnership</u> is proud to announce that one of their priority watersheds, the Galena River Watershed in Illinois, was selected as a 2023 Waters to Watch by the <u>National Fish Habitat Partnership</u>.

The Waters to Watch list, assembled by the nation's leading authorities on aquatic conservation, includes 10 strategic conservation efforts to protect, restore, or enhance fish habitat on rivers, streams, estuaries, and lakes. These voluntary, locally driven projects represent some of the top conservation activities completed or in progress by 20 Fish Habitat Partnerships throughout the country.

The Jo Daviess County Soil & Water Health Coalition, a farmer-led group, formed in the Galena River Watershed after members attended <u>Watershed Leaders Network Workshops</u> led by Fishers & Farmers staff and partners.

"The Fishers & Farmers Partnership has been instrumental to the formation and development of our farmer-led group. The annual workshops gave us the idea for forming our farmer-led group in the first place, and then helped us each year to evaluate our progress and set new goals," says Beth Baranski, Organizing Secretary for the Jo Daviess County Soil & Water Health Coalition.

To date, this coalition has actively participated in a county-wide water resource management plan, organized workshops, and developed digital field tours. Members of the group and local partners are also sampling tributaries to the Galena River to determine contaminant sources. Samples will be used for educational purposes and to inform the strategic placement of best management practices such as no-till, cover crops, prairie strips, riparian buffers, stream bank stabilization, and managed grazing. Currently, this farmer-led group is participating in studies, presenting their experience at conferences and events, and is assisting in the development of a farmer-led learning center at Sinsinawa Mound in southwest Wisconsin.

"We're pleased to be included on the 2023 Waters to Watch list," says Baranski. "The listing is both a welcome acknowledgement of the work done to date and an inspirational boost for the work that lies ahead. Hopefully this recognition will lead to more opportunities for shared learning in the Upper Mississippi River Basin and beyond."


